18. Brief Course Description

Hindi II will enhance students' knowledge of Hindi language and culture of India. The overall goal is to develop functional communicative abilities in students to express basic communication needs with confidence. The skills of speaking, listening, reading and writing in Hindi will be attained by students being exposed to rich authentic linguistic and cultural teaching contexts that emphasize students developing competency in Hindi language and culture. Students will develop an appreciation for the culture of India.

The course objectives include developing communication skills and understanding of cultural aspects. Cultural activities are arranged to provide each student with opportunities to enhance language and cultural learning. These activities include Hindi movies, discussion on important Indian and American events, and field trips to local traditional Indian music programs and/or festivities.

OBJECTIVES:

Communication:

- 1) Students engage in conversations, provide and obtain information, express feelings and emotions, and exchange opinions.
- 2) Students understand and interpret written and spoken language on a variety of topics in Hindi.
- 3) Students present information, concepts and ideas to an audience of listeners or readers on a variety of topics in Hindi.

Cultural Aspect:

- 1) Students demonstrate an understanding of the relationship between the practices and perspectives of the cultures of the Hindi-speaking world.
- 2) Students demonstrate an understanding of the relationship between the products and perspectives of the cultures of the Hindi-speaking world.

Content and Cultural Comparisons:

- 1) Students reinforce and further their knowledge of other disciplines through the Hindi language.
- 2) Students demonstrate understanding of the nature of language through comparisons of the Hindi language with their own.
- 3) Students demonstrate understanding of the concept of culture through comparisons of the Indian culture with their own.

Modes of Communication:

I. Listening (Receptive)

- A. Students understand the main ideas and/or themes from visual media or live presentations on topics of personal interest (hobbies, friends, TV programs) .
- B. Students follow simple instructions in order to participate in age-appropriate classroom and/or cultural activities.

II. Reading (Receptive)

- A. Read short stories with appropriate pronunciation and intonation, and with an expected level of fluency for this level.
- B. Given a selection, be able to comprehend the reading, and construct an appropriate response in writing that is commensurate with the expected level of performance for this stage of language development.

III. Speaking (Productive)

- A. Students use Hindi to talk or write to peers about various activities and events (family vacation, school holidays, daily activities).
- B. Students interact with members of the local community to learn how they use Hindi in their profession and personal lives.
- C. Students demonstrate awareness of the ways of expressing respect and communicating status difference in their own language and in Hindi.
- D. Students present an oral report in Hindi on topics being studied in other classes (nutrition, communities, transportation).
- E. Students present short plays and skits, recite selected poems and anecdotes, and perform for school and community events.

IV. Writing (Productive)

- A. Write complete sentences with subject and verb agreement.
- B. Recognize and Punctuate appropriately.
- C. Write affirmative, negative and interrogative sentences in present, past and future tense at an appropriate level for this stage of language development.
- D. Write a short paragraph in Hindi using acquired vocabulary about daily activity, other subjects or community event.
